Monday - November 18, 2013 Keynote Speaker Dr. Peggy Hines

School Counselors and Equity: Ensuring College and Career Readiness for Every Student

Dr. Peggy Hines is the Executive Director of the National Center for Transforming School Counseling (NCTSC), an organization developed in partnership with The Education Trust. NCTSC works with a network of organizations, state departments of education, school counselor professional associations, higher education institutions, and school districts dedicated to transforming school counselors into powerful agents of change in their schools and in the lives of students. By arming school counselors with the data and knowledge to help schools raise achievement and close gaps, NCTSC takes school counselors from the margins to the mainstream of the mission of schools - preparing all students for access and success in a wide array of postsecondary options. Peggy is the former director of the school counselor program at Indiana State University and past president of the Indiana School Counselor Association. She was a member of the writing team for the American School Counselors Association's National Model for School Counseling Programs and one of the developers of the MetLife Foundation's National School Counselor Training Initiative. Failure Is NOT an Option - Giving Every Student the Opportunity to Be Successful

This session will address how counselors can use a strength-based approach to help at-risk students not only graduate from high school but have the option to go to a two or four year college. The goal is to identify the strengths that the student has and use that as a catalyst to motivate them to see college as a reality. It is also important to recognize the supports and barriers that students will face during this process and locate resources that will help them achieve success. It is important to also recognize what supports students will have during the transition from high school to college in order to insure that they will attend the fall after graduation.

Increasing Awareness, Access & Success for College Readiness & Retention

Nationally, Black, Latino, first generation, and lowincome students are struggling to make it to college graduation. Statistics support this as the achievement gap, but it can also be viewed as an opportunity gap. Evanston Township High School (ETHS), a large, economically, racially and ethnically diverse, public high school is promoting college awareness and increasing access to opportunities while preparing students for success in college by expanding college readiness programs to all students across all grade levels. This culture shift includes increasing awareness of the pathways to AP courses, opening access to rigorous courses and offering a variety of supports that encourage self-determination and promote student growth, leadership, confidence, balance and wellbeing. Goals of this session include understanding the

value and implications of thinking out of the box and brainstorming how you can manipulate the practices implemented at ETHS to work within your own school settings.

The MCLC students are very clear that the opportunity to speak with the staff helps them feel connected and that feeling connected helps them to be successful in the classroom.

Be the Change: Strategies to Support Professional Reflection, Build Capacity for Collaboration, and Enhance Consultation Skills

As School Counselors, we have the potential to play a pivotal leadership role in supporting the development of healthy, thriving professional communities within our schools. And, as evidenced by our experiences, (and supported by research), we know that connected, reflective, and collaborative school communities are essential for producing positive outcomes for all of our students. In this session we will share a number of tools (including Critical Friends' protocols and Adaptive Schools strategies, among others) that the Madison Metropolitan School District School Counseling team has been utilizing within our professional development meetings to become more skillful in our own practice

as well as build our capacity to support the myriad adult and student groups with whom we work in our schools. Participants should come prepared to learn by doing. This will be a "hands-on" session, with a focus on strategies to support three areas of enhanced professional practice: collaboration, consultation, and purposeful reflection. Participants are also invited to bring examples of work products (e.g., lesson plans, presentation materials, newsletter articles, etc.) for which they are seeking feedback from colleagues.

Increasing Access to Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate Programs

The goal of this session will be to provide participants with background information on the disparate levels of student participation by race and income in Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate programs. Looking Within to Support Our Students: The Educational Crisis Facing Young Men of Color — Next Steps in Supporting Minority Students in Schools

Early in 2010, the College Board issued the report The Educational Crisis Facing Young Men of Color. This was the culmination of two years of qualitative research into the comparative and, indeed, in some cases, the absolute lack of success that males of color are experiencing as they traverse the education pipeline. Within a generation, the United States will be a much more diverse nation. In fact, in less than half a century, no racial or ethnic group will be a majority. We also knew that the fastest-growing populations in the country were those minority groups with the lowest levels of educational attainment. We were assured by the data that if present levels of education and current population trends hold, the U.S. will see a decline in the educational attainment of the country as a whole. Since the report was released, the

College Board created a companion workbook that contains activities that are meant to challenge educator perspectives and practices so that educators create an environment that affirms and supports young men of color. The self-reflection and group activities contained in the workbook can facilitate conversations around race, ethnicity, culture, gender and English language status. The goal of the resource is to allow educators to engage with other educators in order to build a web of culturally relevant social and academic supports and resources for young men of color.


