4. Reflective Questions

You will answer these questions in a group at the conference. Please read them through. No written answers are required prior to the conference, but you may consider making some notes to bring with you to your group discussion time.

- 1. In 50 words or less--what are the barriers that are contributing to your school district's achievement/opportunity gaps?
- 2. In 40 words or less--how do you know these are true barriers? Your chaperones will bring data from your school district to discuss (suspension data, AP enrollment, etc.).
- 3. In 30 words or less--who is impacted by these barriers?
- 4. In 20 words or less--what can we do to eliminate these barriers?
- 5. In 10 words or less--how will we know we are making progress?
- 6. What is one goal you want your district to meet in addressing racial achievement and opportunity gaps in your schools?
- 7. List 3 to 5 action steps your team can take to meet that goal.
- 8. List how your goals and action steps connect with the data for your school district.
- 9. List 3 dates during the year that you would like for your district should check on how they're doing on completing the action steps you listed in #7.
- 10. List some community partners and supporters who can help your school district meet its goals.
